Stepping into this role in July 2025, all credit goes to my colleagues for a strong and resilient year within a rapidly shifting global context. I am especially thankful for the leadership of Amy Shenberger, Director of the Study Abroad Office, who served as Interim Vice Provost and guided International Affairs with steadfastness and care over the last year. Her contributions ensured a strong foundation upon which we will continue to build.



Despite some headwinds facing global higher education, our team has celebrated remarkable achievements with the support of our UNT and global partners. In the pages that follow, you'll find numerous activities and initiatives that make me proud to be at UNT.

- We celebrated a record-setting year in study abroad. A total of 662 students studied in 39 countries, the largest group in UNT history. For many, this marked their very first time boarding a plane, embarking on experiences that were nothing short of transformative and proving what everyone in the UNT community already knows: our students are truly remarkable.
- International student recruitment remains a top priority, and we are proud to have reached all-time highs in doctoral and transfer student applications, affirming UNT's reputation as a destination for advanced study and opportunity.
- When students choose UNT for their academic home away from home, they are supported with comprehensive success programs including cross-campus collaborative workshops and events. You'll see that our ISSS and International Programs and Communication Offices were hard at work supporting over 50,000 interactions in Marquis Hall through immigration advising support and global events.
- For the third consecutive year, UNT was named a Fulbright Hispanic–Serving Institution Leader and is the top institution in DFW for receiving visiting Fulbright Scholars and Students. These distinctions highlight the university's commitment to building a globally engaged community.
- We are especially proud to celebrate our 2025 faculty award winners, Drs. Rachita Sharma and Hassan Qandil, who have made on-going and lasting positive contributions to the internationalization of UNT. They are wonderful champions of integrating global perspectives into our campus.

As we look to the year ahead, I remain inspired by the dedication of our students, faculty, and staff. Together, we are not only meeting the demands of a complex global landscape, but we are setting new standards for what it means to be a truly international university.

International Affairs defines international student as a non-immigrant visa holder enrolled in coursework at UNT.

#### **International Student Recruitment Activities**

2024–25 marked the beginning of an anticipated downturn in international student enrollment across the country and around the world. U.S. visa issuance rates began to decrease in Spring of 2024, leading to a decline in enrollment in Fall of 2024. The international student recruitment landscape presented several additional challenges including sharply increased competition from peer institutions expanding their recruitment efforts abroad to rapidly evolving social media technologies fueling 'fair fatigue' and 'webinar weariness'. Not withstanding these trends, UNT received an all-time high of more than 1400 international doctoral and 800 international transfer applications. For the first time, the International Recruitment Office partnered with the UNT International Programs and Immigration Offices to provide innovative, in-person visa interview trainings across India. Efforts are ongoing to further diversify the countries of origin of international students at UNT. This year new recruitment partnerships were initiated in Colombia, Panama, Vietnam and the Philippines.



## **Student Support Programs**

The International Student and Scholar Services Office is committed to providing expert immigration advising and guidance to UNT's international communities.

- 17 fulltime immigration advisors and 15 student assistants.
  90+ hours of scheduled immigration advising each week.
- 47,611 documented visits to and interactions at the ISSS front desk.
- 100,456 e-forms reviewed and processed per U.S. government requirements.
- 200+ students attended **OPT & CPT Workshops** with International Advisors.

The International Programs & Communication Office helps international students thrive at UNT by fostering a smooth transition to campus and community life.

All incoming international students at UNT are required to participate in WINGS – the online International Student Pre–Arrival Orientation course hosted in Canvas. Optional virtual Q&A sessions are held twice per week to compliment WINGS Orientation.

- 1883 students participated in WINGS in Fall 24. 1167 participants in 40 Q&A Sessions in Fall 24. 732 students participated in WINGS in Spring 25. 656 participants in 16 Q&A Sessions in Spring 25.
- 70 students attended virtual  $Funding\ Workshops\$ with International Affairs.
- 70 students attended f Driver's License Workshops with the Department of Public Safety.

#### **International Students and U.S. Tax Requirements**

International Student Tax Workshops and Drop-In Tax Sessions introduce international students to their U.S. tax responsibilities, offering one-on-one and small group guidance when needed. Programs are held virtually and in-person on the main and Discovery Park campuses in Denton. Each year International Affairs contracts with a local provider to offer students free tax preparation services.

- 4774 students utilized the access codes provided to file with Glacier Tax Prep in 2024-25.
- 434 students participated in 17 Tax Workshops and Drop-In Tax sessions in 2024-25.

## **Co-Curricular Programs**

3265 students participated in 98 cultural and community-building programs in 2024-25.

The International Programs and Communication Office provides opportunities for engagement and exposure to countries and cultures across the globe. Programs like **Language Exchange** and **Social Hour** foster relationships among peers and help to build community.

**World Fair** is a tabling event in Marquis Hall. Tables are hosted by students, student organizations, study abroad participants and others to showcase and celebrate UNT's global campus.

The International Education Week Parade, led by UNT's African Percussion Ensemble, kicks off International Affairs' annual celebration of international education and exchange worldwide.

**International Mother Language Day** celebrates languages spoken around the world and highlights the importance of indigenous languages and mother tongues.

**Discover Series** events were hosted this year by students from **Brazil, Iran, Italy, Japan, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Taiwan and <b>Vietnam.** These lively presentations provide students valuable public speaking and leadership opportunities.





Sumeet Anand Pandey, a **Fulbright Visiting Scholar** at UCLA, was hosted by UNT's College of Music in February through the **Fulbright Outreach Lecturing Fund**. During his visit, he presented on his experiences as a Fulbrighter in the U.S., provided lectures and workshops to UNT students, and performed in a Dhrupad concert.

#### **Fulbright Faculty Week**

International Affairs hosted Fulbright Faculty Week in February 2025. Activities included a celebration of UNT's Fulbright faculty awards for 2024–25 and 2025–26. In academic year 2024–25, 3 UNT faculty received a Fulbright–Hays award to Colombia, 1 UNT faculty received a Fulbright Specialist award to the UK, and 4 UNT faculty received Fulbright Scholar Awards to Australia, Austria, Chile and India. In academic year 2025–26, 6 faculty advanced to the second round of reviews for the Fulbright Scholar Program with two faculty selected for awards to Turkey and Romania.

An application workshop and luncheon generated great conversation and feedback on the application process for prospective Fulbrighters. Representatives from the Institute of International Education and World Learning held virtual information sessions about the U.S. Scholar Program and Specialist Program to explore what each of these Fulbright programs offer for faculty in terms of research, teaching, and professional projects. The entire week brought together faculty from across campus to discuss and engage with each other about how Fulbright can help in their professional and personal development as global scholars.



# Visiting Fulbright Scholars and Students

International Affairs hosted a Welcome Lunch in September for Fulbright Visiting Scholars and Students to congratulate them on their awards and welcome them to campus. Fulbright Visiting Scholars receive funding from Fulbright to participate in collaborative research/teaching at U.S. universities while Fulbright Foreign Students receive funding from Fulbright to pursue graduate degrees at U.S. universities.



### Global Fellowships & Programs

#### **Critical Language Scholarship**

The Critical Language Scholarship provides funded opportunities for students and recent graduates to participate in an intensive summer program abroad. Students study a critical language and engage in cultural immersion over an 8–10 week period. CLS is sponsored by the U.S. Department of State. Two UNT students received CLS awards: **Mikella Nguyen** (Korean) and **Lillian Pruett** (Arabic.)

#### **Erasmus+ Program**

The Erasmus+ Program is a European Union (EU) initiative to support academic and research collaboration and international exchanges. The **Department of Rehabilitation & Health Services** in the **College of Health and Public Service** participated in a bilateral international exchange program with Gdańsk University of Technology (Poland) in 2025. The **College of Music** hosted two music scholars from the Royal College of Music (Sweden) during the fall 2024 semester. In spring 2025, the **Department of Merchandising and Digital Retailing** received a scholar from the University of Ljubljana (Slovenia). In summer 2025, a faculty member from the **Department of Learning Technologies** in the **College of Information** participated in a short program to the University of Politehnica Timisoara (Romania).

# Institutional Partnerships & Collaborations

#### **Delegation Visits to UNT**

The **College of Health and Public Service** and International Affairs hosted a delegation from the **Office of the Narcotics Control Board, Thailand**, January 8–15, 2025. The ONCB delegation was led by Police Lieutenant General Phanurat Lukboon, Secretary General of ONCB. The delegation exchanged policy and practices focused on addiction, rehabilitation, and criminal justice. The ONCB delegation visited North Texas drug courts, detention centers, and outpatient treatment facilities as well as lectures at UNT.

**UNT and ONCB signed a Memorandum of Understanding** to provide a framework for exploring collaborations, such as ONCB staff pursuing graduate degrees at UNT and UNT providing additional training to ONCB. The ONCB Secretary General also provided a generous gift donation to the Departments of Rehabilitation and Health Services and Criminal Justice.



International Affairs welcomed students, faculty, and administrators from the **Universidad Autonoma de Chihuahua in Mexico**. Included with their group were 33 students, 8 faculty, and University President Rector Luis Alfonso Rivera Campos.



# UNT has formalized partnership activities through international agreements with more than 110 institutions in 30 countries.

**UNT Study Abroad** welcomed Retired Brigadier General Xhavit Gashi, Director of the RIT Kosovo (A.U.K) Fred C. Cuny Center for Peace and Conflict Studies Summer Program. The **RIT Kosovo Summer Program** is a UNT study abroad program. The program offers international leadership and peace-building courses taught by renowned practitioners and academics with expertise and experience in the United Nations, national governments and militaries, humanitarian organizations, and the private sector.

The University of North Texas welcomed a U.S. Department of State International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP) delegation to campus on Friday, September 27th. The IVLP delegation included Vietnamese government officials and university leaders interested in exploring opportunities for STEM collaboration between the U.S. and Vietnam. The IVLP delegation met with leadership from the Colleges of Engineering, Information, and Science as well as International Affairs.



University of North Texas **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Michael McPherson**, and **President of Hochschule für Musik Würzburg, Christoph Wünsch**, signed a partnership agreement in November 2024 at the North Texas Wind Symphony concert that premiered Hommage à Trois by Christoph Wünsch. This agreement will expand collaboration between the two universities through student exchange opportunities.

## **Intensive English Language** Institute

Founded in 1977, the Intensive English Language Institute proudly continues its tradition of serving English language learners at UNT in a variety of ways. These include supporting International Teaching Assistants from the Toulouse Graduate School, welcoming students from UNT's international partner universities for short-term language and culture programs, and helping degree-seeking students master English for academic purposes. IELI also serves community members who need advanced English training, as well as international government and NGO-sponsored students who choose to study at UNT.

IELI also offers opportunities for UNT linguistics and world languages majors to fulfill their language teaching practicum requirements.

New this year, based on a recommendation from the EducationUSA Office in Fukuoka, Japan, IELI developed a four-week English Plus Culture program for 16 students from Kumamoto University in Japan. These students were particularly interested in learning more about DFW's semiconductor businesses. The students' program was funded by a Japanese government grant.

#### **IELI** by the Numbers

- 272 IELI students represented 32 countries in 2024-25.
- 13 Visiting Fulbright Scholars studied at IELI on a grant from the Institute for International Education.
- 109 IELI graduates are currently enrolled in 25 different degree programs at UNT.

More than half of these students are enrolled in graduate degree programs.
