Important Fall 2023 Updates for J-1 Students

COVID19 Allowance for Online Classes Ends!

J-1 students must maintain a full-time course load during fall and spring semesters.

This means:

- F1 and J1 Undergraduate students must enroll in 12 credit hours or more.
- F1 and J1 Graduate students must enroll in 9 credit hours or more.
- **No online courses may count toward full-time enrollment for J-1 students.**

TRAVELING Outside the U.S. this Summer?

J-1 exchange visitors who wish to travel outside the U.S. should request the ISSS office for a travel endorsement on their DS-2019. Travel endorsements are valid for 1 year or until the program-end date on the DS-2019, whichever comes first.

Please email the ISSS office at jinfo@unt.edu at least 7-10 days prior to the travel date to request a travel endorsement. In addition to a valid travel endorsement, please be sure to have the following immigration documents prior to re-entering the U.S.:

- Valid J1 visa stamp to re-enter the United States (unless you are a citizen of Canada).
- Valid passport that has more than 6 months remaining of its validity.

Note: Beginning April 27, 2023, the U.S. Department of State will allow the international office to apply digital signatures on the DS-2019. The ISSS office may digitally sign and transmit the DS2019 to the J-1 exchange visitor via their UNT email address. Exchange visitors must then print, sign (by hand), and present the paper version of the DS-2019 when re-entering the U.S.

DS-2019 Extensions

DS-2019 Extensions should be submitted to jinfo@unt.edu at least 30 days prior to current DS-2019 end date.

J-1 Students requiring an extension must extend for a minimum of 1 year unless the expected program completion date is sooner.

J-1 SPOTLIGHT: Our J-1 spotlight this Spring is on a visiting scholar from Egypt and a team of international scholars who are integral to the cutting-edge research taking place at the BioDiscovery Institute (BDI).

Meet visiting scholar Yara Kamal Mohamed Ismail from Egypt!

Yara is a short-term visiting scholar from Egypt sponsored by USAID. She is spending her Spring 2023 semester under the tutelage of Dr. Cheng Yu from the Department of Mechanical Engineering. Yara's academic work is focused on construction projects and cold-formed steel design within the field of mechanical engineering. Her research interests include developing a new approach in the design optimization of light gauge steel buildings that will allow people to enjoy a higher standard of living at a relatively lower cost.

Yara chose to come to UNT as an exchange visitor because of Dr. Cheng Yu's expertise in cold-formed steel design. She has learned a great deal from Dr. Yu during her short time at UNT and hopes to use the scientific knowledge that she has gained from this experience to enhance international collaboration in the field of construction engineering. Yara has enjoyed all the activities and resources at Discovery Park and the main campus.

Meet the international researchers at the BioDiscovery Institute!

The BioDiscovery Institute (BDI), established in 2016 as an Institute of Research Excellence is home to several international research scholars from over eight different countries. These international research scholars are an integral part of the multidisciplinary research team that collaborate on large research projects that aim to find solutions to critical societal needs. Several of these research scholars enjoy working at BDI because in addition to being home to the biggest names in plant science, the institute has an open and supportive atmosphere that facilitates innovation and collaboration.

Dr. Anil Girija is a post-doctoral research associate from India who specializes in plant defense mechanisms. He is currently working with Prof. Jyoti Shah on plant defense towards the green peach aphid which devastates many crop plants. **Dr. Md Ashraful Islam is a plant pathologist from Bangladesh** whose research at BDI uses molecular plant pathology to develop disease-resistant wheat varieties that have improved quality and yield. **Dr. Chunliu Zhuo, who is from China**, is a post-doctoral researcher in Dr. Dixon's lab and she is doing research on a plant-natural product where the ultimate goal is to genetically engineer bioenergy crops.

It is not all work and no play with the research scholars at BDI! They enjoy meeting people from all around the world, participating in cultural and recreational activities on and off campus, as well as travelling around Texas and the U.S. with their friends and families during the breaks and vacations. Everyone loves the eclectic variety of restaurants on the Denton Square, the neighborhood parks, the music and art shows, and overall Denton college vibe. Some of the researchers like **Dr. Digar Singh from India**, who are here with their family, are very appreciative of the work-life balance at BDI and UNT. All in all, the international researcher scholars at BDI have an enjoyable and fulfilling time at UNT! We enjoy hosting them on our campus as well!

Countries represented at the BioDiscovery Institute include Bangladesh, Brazil, China, France, India, Philippines, Sri Lanka, and Zimbabwe.
